

Mount Pisgah serves local Front Line Agencies of our Community






Can Anything Good Come from COVID 19?

The Devil's Punchbowl: Lost History

Amid the cries to pull down statues and tear down the Market House in Fayetteville, a historical blight on the community for centuries, I wish to share the story of the eradicated history of *The Devil's Punchbowl*. Shrouded in mystery and local folklore, few of us have ever even heard of this piece of history mainly passed down through oral tradition.

Allegedly, The Devil's Punchbowl was an American Concentration Camp where over 20,000 freed slaves were corralled after the Civil War. The population of Natchez, Mississippi purportedly more than tripled with the release of freed slaves. Fear from feeling overrun with freed slaves, the city turned to the Union soldiers for help. The soldiers herded them into the bowl shape ravine called Devil's Punchbowl where they basically walled them in, separating the men from the women and children. Eventually, they all died, either from torture, starvation, or diseases, such as smallpox.

Today, the camp is over gown with thick, impenetrable vegetation and peach trees with lush fruit that no one will eat. Locals contend that no one will eat the fruit because they know what's buried underneath. My fear of destroying detestable monuments and structures such as the Market House is that the history of what really happened there will be so eradicated that only remnants of the truth remain. Just as time forgot the lives lost at Devil Punchbowl, will future generations forget that slaves were sold at the Market House?

The Jews did not tear down concentration camps, such as the notorious Auschwitz, but instead turned

it into a Memorial Museum that would not allow the world to forget what took place there. There are credible arguments on both sides, those for tearing it down and those against, but could this be a viable option for the Market House? That it become a memorial to the thousands of slaves sold there, that America never forgets, much like the Lynching



Museum in Montgomery, Alabama, the Old Slave Mart Museum in Charleston, South Carolina or the House of Slaves Museum on Goree Island, the Door of No Return where slaves were housed upon leaving Africa and heading to America and other western ports. Even now historians and scholars are trying to refute the validity of Goree Island, but it stands today. As long as it stands, the world will be forced to remember what happened to our ancestors there as they enter the Door of No Return.

<u>According to NBC 4 Washington</u>, one of the team's newest members is a <u>Howard University</u> graduate and its first black female officer.

This year is Captain Remoshay Nelson's first season with the squadron. The regular shows have temporarily

been placed on hold due to the coronavirus pandemic, but the Thunderbirds have been conducting flyovers across D.C., Baltimore, and Atlanta to pay special tribute to people on the front lines battling the pandemic. "I know a small percentage of African American officers, specifically female officers in the Air Force; therefore, to be in a position that is visible, to show little girls that this is attainable, to let them know they can do anything they put their mind to, is an absolute honor," Nelson tells NBC 4 Washington.

Nelson has spent eight years in the Air Force, serving mostly overseas. She says her best decision was the chance to attend <u>Howard University</u>. (Copied from the Internet)
