CONGRESS OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION REGIONAL SITE Committed to Christ, Commissioned for Mission through Christian Education

The General Baptist Congress of Christian Education held its first Regional Congress of Christ Education on February 4, 2017 at E.E. Smith, Fayetteville, North Carolina. Normally, this is a state-wide gathering of associations all across the state convening at one location. However, the annual session has grown so much that it was impossible to adequately accommodate the numerous attendees. In its wisdom, the Executive Board for Congress decided to split the State into two regions by continuing the meeting in Charlotte and by adding the Fayetteville location. The Fayetteville site met first, and the other site met on the second Saturday in February,

They completely ran out of registration kits and it was estimated that 500 or more persons were in attendance!

By 9:30, the area was so crowded that it reminded you of the overcrowded experienced in Charlotte. One theme that was heard repeatedly is that churches must seek new ways to reach and teach their congregations, that what may have been hot and appealing 3 years ago may not work today. They stressed that we don't compromise the Gospel, but we must recognize that this is a different generation, particularly with our youth and young adults, who are products of a technology impacted era. In comparing classes attended, most felt that the first Regional Session worthwhile presented relevant was and information.

reading. They may teach you to play a game, compete, and to prepare for a future in such arenas as golf, baseball, basketball or football. They may even help to



teach you the love of cooking as did the Easy Bake Oven.

In the late 1960s, my oldest two daughters received together a wagon (see copy above of the type, make and model). That Radio Flyer



was used to pull the girls in the yard and to the store. It was also used to haul water from the pump to the washing machine (wringer type). That old-fashioned washing machine was better than a wash board. I used both, _____

so I'm an expert in their use. And, it was used to haul wood first from out of the woods, in long poles, and when cut up into small pieces to fit the heater, it carried the wood to the porch for



taking into the house. It was used for chores more than for playing, and the children never knew the difference. They enjoyed helping by pulling the wagon when it was not too heavy.

Our three daughters are good cooks, and I would like to think it is from first owning an Easy Bake Oven and then learning how to work the stove.. They learned to do all of the tasks in a house, little by little. Some of the time they were taught more as a game than as work. As soon as they wanted to wash dishes, I let them. When they wanted to cook, I encouraged and taught them safety, as they used knives, other utensils and the stove. Almost anything in the house can be put into a game. The clothes hamper can be a great goal post. After we rolled clothes we would back down the hallway and toss them into the hamper making a point.

Families can make their own games. I am reminded that soon after watching the Tuskegee Airmen in the 1990s; my young



grandsons used a small fan in front of a box to make their own plane. They would spend hours in the box flying as a Tuskegee Airman. The oldest grandson was always Lieutenant Lee. He knew Lt. Lee was the pilot and he was in the front.

Additionally we see evidence of Forward Mount Pisgah in re-vitalizing and restructuring the Mission Ministry, Youth Empowerment, Deacon and Trustees' Ministry, Choirs and others. Then we see addition of new ministries such as Girls Praise Dance Ministry, Marriage Ministry, New Members Coordinator, and implementation of Right Now Media online resource library. As we look at changes, it's not works, iust within ministry but also improvements being made to the physical building, itself.

All the windows in the Fellowship Hall were replaced. A 15 passenger van was purchased,

paid in full. Ladies bathroom in the Fellowship Hall had a recent update, and internet is church-



wide so that teachers can use technology in their classes.



The last project completed in moving forward was the installation of mechanical /electrical doors with panic

bars. This enhances security, ensuring that no one can enter without being given access. It also has handicap push pad to assist those who need this accommodation. Next project in process is repairing, replacing, and rearranging the pews in the sanctuary. The journey has been more than a dream, more than a hope; it has been a God favored reality. *Rev. FAYETTEVILLE/CUMBERLAND COUNTY CHAPTER, SHAW UNIVERSITY ALUMNI ASSOCIATION REACHES \$100,000 ENDOWMENT

Dreams do come true! Goals sometimes are reached, and that is exactly what happened when the Fayetteville/ Cumberland County Chapter of the Shaw University Alumni Association raised a total of \$100,000 for a scholarship endowment with Shaw



University. The Chapter met the challenge issued by Dr. Dorothy C. Yancy, Interim President, by raising \$100,000 in five years. In the *"Bear Spirit,"* the Chapter reported \$8,500 in 2012, \$10,500 in 2013, \$12,500, in 2014, \$13,000 in 2015, and finally in 2016 the biggest donation of \$17,000 carried the goal to its achievement amount of \$100,000.00.

During the 2016 Homecoming Banquet, The Fayetteville/Cumberland County Chapter members in attendance echoed three rousing "Thank You" praises as the \$100,000 amount was announced. Excitement filled the banquet hall. Dr. Lacv informed the audience that "We could not have done it without the support and pravers of all who wanted us to succeed. Succeed we did! Success came from the good of the Lord and His grace." Additionally, he said sacrifices were made by the Chapter officers and members, Shaw University staff and students, benefactors from across the region, other alumni and many businesses who wanted to see the goal reached.
